What a Lovely Day for a Countryside Tour of King!

The weather could not have been better on Saturday, September 17, for our King Township Historical Countryside Tour. Eighty-two people in 43 cars took part in the self-guided tour of 12 historic venues throughout beautiful King. Taking part in the tour was a 1950 Plymouth Coupe similar to the one pictured on our invitation.

The tour scheduled to begin at 12:30, kicked off even earlier due to a couple of very keen registrants who arrived closer to noon. Each car received a loot bag, including the 50th Anniversary Countryside tour map, a few instructions and some KTHS related goodies, and were sent on their way.

Five of the 12 spots had volunteers stationed who were familiar with the site. **Elaine Robertson**, who was dressed in Edwardian costume including a black armband to



honour Queen Elizabeth II who had passed away on September 8th, was at the Eversley Church and Cemetery. **Gerry Alleston** was at the Kettleby Anglican Church. **Mary Asselstine** was at the Schomberg Emmanuel Presbyterian Church, and **George Burt** at the Masonic Hall in Schomberg. George at the Masonic Hall reported, "Thanks to KTHS we had the opportunity to meet and welcome 22 interesting and interested visitors to our historic Masonic Building. Three of the male visitors had fathers who were Masonic, which added to their visit."



However, the highlight of the tour was the Blair Burrows Mud House, where the current owner, Mimi Barrow, generously gave

tours inside this unique home. KTHS Director, Murdene Pozdrowski, was stationed at this site and reported that between 60-70 people visited the site that day and got a rare look inside this

1937 pise de terre (rammed earth) house.



Following the tour, all participants were encouraged to return to Laskay Hall at the KHCC site to enjoy some refreshments and an opportunity to win door prizes. About 50 people returned to partake in a delicious cake from Dorio's Bakery in Kettleby and a chance to win one of our incredible locally donated door prizes.

Progress Update on the History of King Township Book

When **Ann Love** and **Sharon Bentley** took on this project, they told the Historical Society Board they would like to write the history of King with the landscape in mind. How the land and the natural world has changed over the time people have lived here and how people have adjusted their lives to the land.

They are not rewriting the story of the growth of the hamlets and villages as Elizabeth Gillham did so beautifully. They are not focusing on Eaton Hall or Mary Lake as Kelly Mathews so ably did. Ann and Sharon are looking for new stories where possible and fresh new



angles for the pivotal events that are a must to include – Simcoe's legacy, first settlements, the Lloydtown Rebellion, and so on.

Sharon has been digging through on-line and at-site archives. So many archives are digitized now – newspapers, community museums, major university and government collections across Ontario and North America. Sharon has also found online old books – many with keyword search capabilities – as well as the proceedings of societies, university theses, academic journals, and more. Sharon has organized a few research field trips such as visiting the Ontario

Archives and several long time King residents. The Thomas Fisher Rare Book Room is upcoming.

Ann has been reading and building structural ideas. Utilizing the research and always keeping in focus the relationship to King, Ann has written rough drafts for 3 sections of 9 in the book. The running narrative of the work will start at the end of the Ice Age and will end after a look into the near future.

Ann and Sharon have invited guest authors to add cameo pieces to each section. The guest authors are currently writing their first drafts for submission.

At this point, no final date has been set for submission of the manuscript to the publisher, but discussions in that vein are underway.

His expeditions range from mapping rivers to archaeological projects, but Shoalts is best known for his long solo wilderness journeys, including crossing alone in a canoe nearly 4,000 km of Canada's Arctic. Named one of the "greatest living explorers" by CBC and even declared "Canada's Indiana Jones" by the *Toronto Star*, Shoalts is a regular guest on TV and radio. His books include *Alone Against the North, A History of Canada in 10 Maps, and Beyond the Trees: A Journey Alone Across Canada's Arctic, all of them national bestsellers.* He has a PhD from McMaster University in history.



Searching for Answers: The Story of James McCallum and the Mystery of the Historic Posts in King *By Bill Salter*

At the southwest corner of the 15th Side Road and Weston Road, just north of the hamlet of Strange, stands a very unusual post about four feet high, and shaped somewhat like a candle.



There are three more similar posts along the south side of the 15th and to the west. Two of these are at the entrance to the property on either side of the driveway, one of which has been badly damaged over time. The other stands some distance along the road at the western corner of the property.



James McCallum was born in 1807 in Skipness, Argyleshire, Scotland, married Christina McVannel in 1839, and emigrated to Canada to settle in the Hamlet of Strange, where he purchased property in 1841 and constructed a wooden framed house in 1857. In January of 1867, he purchased from Andrew Morton, a 100-acre property at the southwest corner of Weston Road and the 15th Side Road, the property on which these posts were erected.



There is now a stone dwelling on that property, but it is not known whether it was built by James McCallum. Nor is it known for certain if it was James McCallum who erected these posts, or whether or not there is any significance to the candle like shape. The interesting thing that connects them to him is the two quite similar grave markers in the St. Andrews Presbyterian Cemetery.

We were able to communicate with Dan McCallum, a direct descendant of James McCallum now living in British Columbia. Together with other members of his family, he has researched his family lineage, and when contacted recently, was very familiar with the grave markers but not aware of the existence of the property posts, and therefore unable to offer any

insight as to the significance of the candle shape.

Perhaps one of our KTHS members may have information to share or insights to offer into the significance of the unusual shape of the posts or of the grave markers. If so, we would be very pleased to hear from you!






What's Happening at the King Heritage & Cultural Centre 2920 King Road, King City

History of KTHS in Brief:


